SPEED GUNS CHALLENGED

MCN reader questions laser gun evidence - and could set precedent for millions in refunds

HOUSANDS of riders could be entitled to millions of pounds in compensation if an MCN reader wins his court battle against a speeding fine. Spurred on by an MCN investigation which showed a commonly-used laser speed gun can give inaccurate readings when pointed at bikes, Yessin Meggaro is using our evidence to challenge a speeding charge against him.

Meggaro, 27, from Bristol was stopped by police while riding his Suzuki GSX-R600 on the A4 in Bath. He said: "They claim the bike was doing 37 mph in a 30 zone, but I know my speed was 30. I'm going to fight this all the way."

Meggaro has applied for legal aid to fight his case, after we put him in touch with Kirwan's Solicitors in Wirral (0151-608-9078). Partner Paul Ford has agreed to represent him.

Ford said: "We are monitoring the situation closely and will look at all the options available to Mr Meggaro as and when the case progresses."

In July, we revealed that the laser gun used in speed camera vans all over the UK had never been tested for accuracy on motorcycles despite worries over its reliability. The handheld gun was given type approval by the Home Office for police use without the crucial test.

Paul Smith, founder of Safe Speed

and one of the country's leading road safety campaigners, said: "The Home Office must immediately suspend type approval on these devices, pending a full investigation. If Meggaro's case eventually goes to Crown Court, it will set a legal precedent, then people will be entitled to appeal against previous convictions based on the police using an LTT 20.20 camera.

"Millions of people will be entitled to refunds, licence points removed, an estimate, over five million people have been convicted on laser speed meter evidence in the last five years. The cost of refunds alone could run into many millions."

Engineering professor John Brignell says the error is caused by the laser moving a tiny distance over the surface of the target—an effect called "slip". He added that the camera only need to move by "about the thickness of a human hair" for the error to occur.

The accuracy of the guns has already been questioned by leading authority Dr Michael Clark, chairman of the European Standards Committee on Vehicle Detectors.

Goodwood celebrates past glory

MORE than 100,000 people visited last . weekend's Goodwood Revival meeting at the legendary Sussex circuit where bikes played a bigger

role than ever before.
Although Goodwood was predominantly used for car racing in its 1950s and '60s heyday, the revival hosts the Barry Sheene Memorial bike race, which provided some of the closest racing of the weekend.

Plus, hordes of visitors, most in period dress, were greeted by a stunning display of pre-1966 bikes in prime position near the circuit's entrance.

Jo Watts was instrumental in organising the display, inviting members of three Rockers' clubs to bring bikes dating from 1945 to 1966. She said: "We started coming here five years ago with just two bikes. The following year we had six then 12. But this year we've got 63. "More and more people

and rockers each year. They've always been a key part of the Goodwood Revival."

The bikes weren't just a static display, either, as they took to the track each morning before the racing as part of the daily opening ceremony.

Watts said: "Most of these bikes have been owned by the chaps since they were young. We've got some of the original rockers from Brighton beach here they're the ones that really understand the spirit of Goodwood."

MCN got into the spirit, too, entering the Barry Sheene Memorial races as part of our 50th anniversary celebrations. Our own Michael Neeves lined up alongside legends like Wayne Gardner, Jamie Whitham and even ex-F1 racer Gerhard Berger to compete in the bike event. Read about his experience on page 24.

Harry: 'One loves bikes'



COOL pose, but why the artificial mud Harry?

PRINCE Harry has spoken openly for the first time about his love for motorcycles in an interview held last week to mark his 21st birthday.

Posing in motocross gear on his brother William's Yamaha XT600, Harry's face was allegedly even splattered with mud by

make-up artists for that off-road look. But even though the Prince was being presented as a biker, he wasn't allowed to show off his skill for the press because he'd forgotten his helmet.

Harry, who owns a Yamaha DT125, said: "William and I both bomb around the fields. It shakes the cobwebs out." The brothers ride their dirt bikes around their father's farm in Gloucestershire.

The Prince's candid remarks about motorcycling show that a love of two wheels runs in the family. William was pictured last year on a Triumph Daytona 650 and his grandfather, the Duke of Edinburgh, has been spotted riding a monkey bike around his palatial grounds.

200mph+ MV Agusta!

JUST when you thought MV Agusta couldn't create anything more exotic, it's come up with its most powerful machine the 200mph F4 Veltro.

Built by MV's race department, only 23 of the track-only bikes will be made, with a price of over £30,000. Weighing in at just 170kg, its top speed is claimed to be over 200mph.

And MV Agusta's UK importer, Three Cross Motorcycles, says it's prepared to bring the Veltro here if it gets enough

The slick-shod machine makes a claimed 190bhp, and hints at what we can expect from the F4 homologation special for WSB that is due to be launched at the end of this year. That bike will be even more powerful,

and even more expensive. It will get an even more highly developed engine, with around 200bhp – MV reckons it has already successfully tested race-spec

motors with 220bhp.

Basically a WSB bike with lights, only 150 will be made - enough to homologate

it for international racing.
At over £41,000, it will be expensive for a road bike, but relatively cheap for serious racers - as virtually all the parts you need to be competitive on the track will already be fitted.



Is it real or is just a game?

THE next generation of motorcycle console games has been leaked to MCN - and it's more lifelike than anything before.

Called the Tourist Trophy, the game is not based on the Isle of Man, but is set in a large city where players can race more than



250 different bikes, including Honda's Blackbird and NSR250, Yamaha's MT-01 and Majesty scooter(!), Kawasaki's ZX-10R and ZRX1200 and Suzuki's Katana and GSX-R600.

Sony UK was tight-lipped about the exact details of the game, but confirmed it's being developed by Polyphony Digital, the company behind the massively popular and ultra-realistic Gran Turismo car racing

The game claims to mimic motorcycle behaviour exactly - meaning wheelies, sliding into corners and spinning up the rear on the way out. It will be released in Spring 2006 on the Playstation 2 and 3, with a price yet to be confirmed.
